Remembrance Day In Skipton Saturday November 11th 2023

A very pleasing crowd assembled at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, to remember those Service Men and Service Women who have fought in various conflicts around the world.

This year Remembrance Day 2023, marks the thirtieth Anniversary of the return of "The Unknown Soldier" from where he lay, back to his homeland, Australia, to be laid to rest at the Nation's War Memorial in Canberra.

Remembrance Day is a memorial day observed in Commonwealth member states since the end of the First World War to honour armed forces members who have died in the line of duty.

The day is also marked by war remembrances in several other non-Commonwealth countries.

In most countries, Remembrance Day is observed on 11 November to recall the end of First World War hostilities. Hostilities ended "at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month" of 1918, in accordance with the armistice signed by representatives of Germany and the Entente between 5:12 and 5:20 that morning. The First World War formally ended with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles on 28 June 1919.

<u>George's recipe for a fine Potato Salad</u>

Take a variety of fresh garden herbs, sufficient, when chopped finely, to fill half a cup

KEEP DRY!!!! Peel à large potato. Chop into bite sized cubes.

Slide into a large quantity of BOILING salt water.

Cook until JUST soft

(Time will depend on the potato variety, cube size etc)

Drain and spread into a single layer,

Add salt, and pepper

and sprinkle with the chopped herbs

Place in a bowl and leave to cool.

On a large plate (oval if available) put, beetroot, slices,

finely shredded lettuce and slices of tomato,

placed so glimpses of white plate are visible.

Drizzle olive oil over now cold herbed and seasoned

potato cubes.

Serve potato cubes on to salad plate.




The Court House Museum and the Old Police House



Fire restrictions announced for Pyrenees and Ararat

The Fire Danger Period (FDP) will begin at 01.00am on Monday, 20 November for the following municipalities in CFA's District 16.

• Pyrenees Shire

• Rural City of Ararat

The El Niño weather pattern means Victorians can expect a hotter and drier summer than recent years, and communities should begin preparing their properties and creating a Bushfire Survival Plan.

CFA District 16 Assistant Chief Fire Officer Bernie Fradd said with grass and undergrowth rapidly drying off it is important that people take care with their clean up before the restrictions commence.

"We have already seen a number of burn-offs escape over recent weeks, which has led to the response of brigades," ACFO Fradd said.

"Unless people have the resources and experience, any burning off should now be left until the Fire Danger Period is over.

"Our statistics show around 60 to 70 per cent of fires during the Fire Danger Period are caused by reckless activity involving equipment such as grinders or mowers in dry grass and out-of-control burn-offs or campfires.

"It is important residents ensure that all fires on their property are properly extinguished and that they always have enough water on hand.

"Mowing, slashing, pruning and general clean-up activities around your property are still really effective ways to reduce the fire risk to yourself and your neighbours in preparation.

While CFA's 52,000 members are poised to respond and support communities this bushfire season, they're urging people to use common sense and take responsibility for preventing fires.

Residents in Pyrenees and Ararat are asked to take this opportunity ahead of the FDP to clean up their properties and for landowners to conduct safe private burn-offs where possible.

Those conducting burn-offs must notify authorities online at the Fire Permits Victoria website (www.firepermits.vic.gov.au), or by calling ESTA on 1800 668 511.

By registering your burn-off online, you allow emergency call takers to allocate more of their time taking calls from people who need emergency assistance immediately.

No burning off is permitted during the FDP without a Permit to Burn, which can be applied for through the Fire Permits Victoria website.

There are very strict conditions attached to these permits and the liability sits with the permit holder to ensure they always act safely.

Fire Danger Period information:

A written permit is required to burn off grass, undergrowth, weeds or other vegetation during the FDP. You can apply for a permit at firepermits.vic.gov.au. It can also be issued by the Municipal Fire Prevention Officer or the CFA District Office.

- Lighting fires in the open without a permit can bring a penalty of more than \$21,800 and/or 12 months imprisonment. For a full list of conditions, visit cfa.vic.gov.au/can.
- Farmers can find legal guidelines and practical advice at cfa.vic.gov.au/farms.
