# Corangamite Shire New Business Assistance Scheme

- Creative Industries and Placemaking up to \$2,000 to activate a public space and increase participation in community life.

# CHANGES TO KERBSIDE RECYCLING COLLECTION IN GOLDEN PLAINS SHIRE

Golden Plains Shire Council is gearing up to introduce a new household waste and recycling system that will improve the way residents recycle at home.

Under Victorian Government legislation, all Councils must move to a standard four-bin system: red for general rubbish, yellow for mixed recycling, lime green for combined food and garden organics (no later than by 2030), and purple for glass (no later than by 2027).

In line with the changes, Council is commencing with the introduction of a new separate purple glass bin in 2024. At the same time of the introduction of the new purple bin, the frequency of collection for the yellow recycling bin will change from weekly to fortnightly.

Golden Plains Shire residents will soon need to separate their waste and recycling into three streams:

Glass

Mixed recyclables

General waste

Council's waste data shows that around 15 per cent of the community's mixed recycling is made up of glass bottles and jars. By putting glass bottles and jars in a separate bin, more of them can be recycled into new items and the quality of other recyclables will be improved.

From October 2024, residents from Golden Plains Shire Council will start using their new glass purple bin for glass only. Until then, households should keep using the current waste and recycling system as normal.

Golden Plains Shire Council Mayor Cr Brett Cunningham said the introduction of the new glass purple bin would help improve recycling outcomes and divert waste from landfill.

"Council is committed to improving and enhancing its waste practices and keeping glass separate has been shown to improve the quality of other recyclable materials. This helps create a more environmentally responsible collection service for our Golden Plains Shire community," Cr Cunningham said.





# Pyrenees Shire News New cricket nets at hit in Beaufort

Beaufort's Goldfields Recreation Reserve now has three brand new cricket practice nets and a storage shed for the cricket club and little athletics club.

The cricket facilities at the reserve haven't been updated since being built in 1970 and these new facilities provide a better practice surface and improves safety for all users.

"Being able to provide better facilities for our clubs around the Shire is fantastic. These new nets address significant safety concerns with the old nets, making sure all our players are able to safely train," said Pyrenees Shire Council Mayor Cr Robert Vance.

The new nets and storage shed were unveiled on Monday by Member for Ripon Martha Haylett MP, marking the completion of the \$305,681 facility.

The new facilities were made possible with a \$100,000 grant from the Victorian Government, a \$135,681

contribution from Pyrenees Shire Council, and contributions of \$30,000 from the Beaufort Community Bank and Australian Cricket

Infrastructure Fund, and \$10,000 from the Beaufort Cricket Club.

"It takes a lot of hard work to get a project like this off the ground everyone involved in making this happen should be proud of the result," Cr Vance said.

The nets will be available for use by local cricket clubs, visiting cricket clubs, and local schools.

"We look forward to this facility being used by both our community and visiting cricket clubs for many years to come," Cr Vance said.

# FARMERS URGED TO MONITOR DAMP HAYSTACKS FOR FIRE RISK

Skipton Community News

CFA is urging farmers to ramp up their hay maintenance for the remainder of the season, following a surge in haystack fires, with CFA responding to more than 50 since November.

Igniting predominantly in the western parts of the state across the Wimmera and Loddon Mallee, CFA has responded to 29 in the North West region and 12 in the West region.

The rise calls for the agriculture sector to monitor the moisture and temperature of their hay more regularly, to store in separate stacks and in sheds away from farming equipment and structures.

A recent haystack fire of over 1,000 hay bales in Arapiles on a total fire ban day in the Wimmera and

the Mallee serves as a timely reminder for the agriculture sector to ensure they are implementing the appropriate management tools to prevent fire risk.

CFA District 17 Commander Lindsay Barry said spontaneous combustion is the leading cause of haystack fires in Victoria and just one damp bale is enough to ignite a whole stack.

"We are currently in the storage phase of hay season, and there are some contributing factors that lead to ignition," Lindsay said.

"Unfortunately, at the beginning of the season, some bales weren't produced to industry standard, and were stored away with too much moisture.

"Green or damp hay is susceptible to overheating, so those two in combination will make a fire."

Lindsay said due to the significant rain we have received during summer, haystacks that were neither placed inside a shed nor covered with a tarp have been considerably exposed.

"The hay has been pressed for so long, and because of the summer we've had, the majority of fires are where hay has been stored outside and exposed to the elements.' Lindsay said.

"Water and hay don't really mix, especially when they stack together. This creates organic decomposition which produces heat, and you end up with a hay fire due to spontaneous ignition."

Having experienced something similar this time three years ago, Lindsay recalls farms received over 100 millimetres of rain in one storm hitting their haystacks, and a trail of fires as a result.

"For farmers who own hay, or who manage haystacks, we need them to be more vigilant and ensure they're doing regular temperature checks," Lindsay said.

"If they are warm, put measures in place to break down and separate the stacks and use machinery to put in strategic breaks if you can.

"Because of recent weather, we can only implement maintenance and management now."

# CFA **Keeping our heritage safe**

Cultural landmarks, artefacts and other evidence made over thousands of years of continual occupation by Victoria's Indigenous communities are irreplaceable and protected by legislation.

CFA actively encourages a proactive approach to protect heritage values, whether they are of Indigenous or non-Indigenous (historic) heritage:

We include cultural heritage values advisers in incident management teams (IMT).

We include cultural heritage awareness information in the annual preseason incident management team briefings.

Joint Fuel Management Program plans as part of CFAs vegetation management program include thorough heritage values assessments for each treatment.

The annual program of vegetation management activities across Victoria includes a range of different treatments. Fuel reduction burning along roadsides, some reserves and private land is the main method of fuel management we undertake, usually in spring or autumn.

Increasingly, we support Traditional Owner groups to carry out cultural burning, which can also help reduce local fire risk. Other methods we use to reduce fire risk include non-burn fuel treatments including mechanical such as mulching or slashing of weedy vegetation, and sometimes biological such as grazing animals to remove and lower grassy fuels.

Each treatment option has a different level of risk to identified heritage values present within the landscape. To reduce potential damage to any known or recorded values at a site, whether Indigenous or historic origin, steps are taken to identify and protect those identified values.

CFA's cultural heritage adviser reviews every fuel treatment nominated in the Joint Fuel Management Program to identify any recorded Indigenous or historic heritage values. If a recorded value does exist, a suitable way is found to protect the value identified.

Heritage values vary greatly, from the conspicuous and obvious to the indiscernible and intangible. The identified value may be a living or dead tree with a shield, coolamon or canoe tree, or even climbing toe

holds cut to make possum hunting easier. Or it could be a large, fire-hollowed veteran tree.

"In CFA, as in emergency services more broadly, we do our best to make sure our people on the ground have the best information at hand," Cultural Heritage Adviser Michael Sherwen said.

"But we always ask our people in the field to keep their eyes open to the possibility of new finds. For example, after the 2020 Budj Bim fires near Heywood, the leaf litter layer was burnt off and revealed previously unknown ancient stone eel traps and stone house sites.

Another example was at Ruffy after a wildfire. During site rehabilitation works CFA members noticed grooves in rocks.

"Later inspections by Traditional Owners confirmed they were previously unknown axe-grinding grooves, and nearby they found birthing trees and other artefacts. More of our heritage is always being revealed."

Certain areas are known to hold burial mounds, ceremonial sites (such as Corroboree rings), stone formations or birthing sites. You may also find axe heads (see the main photo of an axe head in situ).

Areas where flood plains occur in riverine environments, such as along our major river systems including associated wetlands and billabongs, are likely to have numerous cooking mounds throughout.

In the Budj Bim World Heritage Landscape in southwest Victoria, an entire landscape is identified as having "living cultural connection".

The recognised value may also relate to the heritage gates of a parkland reserve, mining, historic bridges, or an Avenue of Honour viewed as a local or regional landmark and icon.

Ways to protect a particular value will depend on the physical nature of the identified value, the fuel types and the proposed fuel treatment. Mitigation measures are developed in consultation with the person who has nominated the treatment, usually the district's vegetation management officer, and may be as simple as excluding a section from treatment if there is a need to do so.

Victoria's heritage belongs to all of us, just as it belongs to generations who will come after us. It is our obligation to carry out our activities ensuring the legacies of heritage left to us are safe-guarded.

# COMMUNITY VISION 2040 REFRESH – SHARE YOUR THOUGHTS AND MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Golden Plains Shire residents and visitors have an opportunity to review Council's Community Vision 2040 to ensure we continue to work towards our community's goals.

Between 2019 and 2020, community members shared their thoughts and aspirations to create the Golden Plains Shire Community Vision 2040. The Community Vision 2040 identifies four priority areas; Community, Liveability, Prosperity, and Sustainability to be focused upon for the next 20 years.

Community members are now invited to help review this important strategic document through an extensive community engagement process from Monday 15 January to Friday 29 March 2024.

Community engagement activities will include an online Have Your Say survey, meetings with key community groups, opportunities for residents and visitors to engage at local community events, including markets, and a Community Engagement Workshop available to attend in Bannockburn and Smythesdale.

Golden Plains Shire Mayor Cr Brett Cunningham said Council wanted to ensure the Community Vision 2040 continued to reflect community aspirations and goals.

"When developing the Community Vision 2040 document throughout 2019 and 2020, community members told Council they envisioned enhanced social networks, increased spaces for young people and the aged and disability community, as well as upgraded civic amenities.

"There was also a focus on education, and the promotion and protection of sustainable practices were sought while greater employment, community events, and connectivity were also recommended," Cr Cunningham said.

"As our community evolves, we are now asking if the Community Vision 2040 still reflects their aspirations to ensure we're still working towards the right goals.

"I really encourage people to share their thoughts and make a difference through the consultation process," he said.

Once the consultation is complete, Council will prepare a What We Heard report summarising the feedback provided by the community in mid-2024. Council will then prepare a draft updated Community Vision 2040 document which will be considered for endorsement by Council in September 2024.

After November's Council election, the document will then assist the newly elected Council in preparing the next Council Plan.
