

# Vietnam Veterans Day Battle of Long Tan, 1966

Friends of the RSL Skipton Branch were honoured to be able to mount a ceremony on Friday 18<sup>th</sup> August to commemorate Vietnam Veterans Day and the Anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan.

President of the Friends, Graham Layley led those assembled in a welcome spot of sunlight through the meaning of the day and through details of the Battle of Long Tan, in which 27 Australian soldiers died.

It is the first time Friends of the RSL have marked this day, Graham promised that it would be an annual event from now on, Skipton's chance to honour and acknowledge the service and sacrifices of those who served in the Vietnam Conflict, which ended for Australia 50 years ago, though the memories and scars remain.

## Commemorative Services & Events 50th Anniversary of Long Tan

On Friday 18<sup>th</sup> August Australians assembled at the Country's War Memorials, to honour the service and sacrifice, for some the Supreme Sacrifice, of Australia's Servicemen and Women during the Vietnam War at nationwide commemorative services this month.

The 50th anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan on 18 August — which is also Vietnam Veterans Day — the centrepiece of commemorations honouring Australia's Vietnam War veterans.

Almost 60,000 Australians served in Vietnam from 1962 until 1975, 521 lost their lives and more than 3,000 were wounded. Many more veterans suffered, and continue to suffer, because of their service.

The Battle of Long Tan took place on 18 August 1966. It was the one of the fiercest battles fought by Australian soldiers in the Vietnam War, seeing 105 Australians and three New Zealanders from D Company 6RAR fighting off and defeating a Main Force Viet Cong Regiment including North Vietnamese troops.

A total of 17 Australians were killed in action and 25 were wounded, one of whom later died of his wounds. D Company were greatly assisted by an ammunition resupply by RAAF helicopters, close fire support from New Zealand's 161 Field Battery, together with additional artillery support from the Australian task force base at Nui Dat, and the arrival of reinforcements in APCs as night fell.

# <u>Vietnam Veterans' Day and the 50th</u> anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan

The **Battle of Long Tan** was a significant moment in Australia's war in Vietnam. On 18 August 1966, in a rubber plantation near the village **of Long Tan**, Australian soldiers fought one of their fiercest battles of the war

The **Battle of Long Tan** (18 August 1966) took place in a rubber plantation near Long Tân, in Phước Tuy Province, South Vietnam, during the Vietnam War. The action was fought between Viet Cong (VC) and People's Army of Vietnam (PAVN) units and elements of the 1st Australian Task Force (1 ATF).

Australian signals intelligence (SIGINT) had tracked the VC 275th Regiment and D445 Battalion moving to a position just north of Long Tan. By 16 August, it was positioned near Long Tan outside the range of the 1 ATF artillery at Nui Dat. Using mortars and recoilless rifles (RCLs), on the night of 16/17 August, the VC attacked Nui Dat from a position 2 kilometres (1.2 mi) to the east, until counter-battery fire made it stop. The next morning D Company, 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (6 RAR), departed Nui Dat to locate the firing positions and determine the direction of the VC withdrawal. D Company found weapon pits and firing positions for mortars and RCLs, and around midday on 18 August made contact with VC elements.

Facing a larger force, D Company called in artillery support. Heavy fighting ensued as the VC attempted to encircle and destroy the Australians, who were resupplied several hours later by two UH-1B Iroquois from No. 9 Squadron RAAF. With the help of strong artillery fire, D Company held off a regimental assault before a relief force of M113 armoured personnel carriers and infantry from Nui Dat reinforced them that night. Australian forces then pulled back to evacuate their casualties and formed a defensive position; when they swept through the area next day, the VC had withdrawn and the operation ended


on 21 August.



victory, due to the political success of an effective ambush and securing of the area around the village.

Whether the battle impaired the capabilities of the VC is disputed.

**6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment** (6 RAR) is a mechanised infantry battalion



6 RAR was raised on 6 June 1965 at Alamein Barracks at Enoggera in Brisbane, Queensland, when a cadre of officers and non-commissioned officers (NCOs) and two rifle companies were transferred from 2 RAR to form the nucleus of the new battalion. The battalion was then brought up to full strength when an intake of 250 national servicemen marched-in in September 1965. The battalion's complement of platoon commanders was rounded out shortly after this with the arrival of six Scheyville graduates.

The battalion's first commanding officer was Lieutenant Colonel Colin Townsend, DSO, while Warrant Officer 1 George Chinn, DCM, came from the Special Air Service Regiment (SASR) based at Campbell Barracks in Perth as its first regimental sergeant major. It was initially assigned to the 6th Task Force (which was later to become 6th Brigade). [1] In early 1966, 6 RAR received orders to deploy to Vietnam as part of the expansion of Australia's forces there. In order to prepare for this, the battalion undertook lead-up training at the Jungle Training Centre at Canungra and then at the Shoalwater Bay Training Area before the advance party flew out for Saigon on 31 May 1966. ## COMMONWEALTH HOME SUPPORT PROGRAM

The Commonwealth Home Support Program (CHSP) supports older people who are still managing at home, but require some extra assistance to continue living independently and safely at home. We can work with you to help you maintain your independence at home.

To be eligible you must be aged 65 years or older (50 years or older for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people) or 50 years or older (45 years or older for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people), on a low income and homeless, or at risk of being homeless.

Services available through the CHSP include, Allied Health and Therapy Services, District Nursing, Meals on Wheels, Social Support Groups, Individual Social Support and Personal Care Services.

# Legacy Week, 27<sup>th</sup> August to 2<sup>nd</sup> September 1923



2023 marks a hundred years since the inception of an idea that would keep the **Promise** made in the trenches of the First World War by an Australian soldier to his dying mate. "I'll look after the missus and kids."

In 1923 Maj. Gen. Sir John Gellibrand formed a "Remembrance Club" in Hobart, followed by fellow returned soldier Lt .Gen Sir Stanley Savige who formed a similar Club in Melbourne, which he called "Legacy."

This was the start of the keeping of the Promise, to care for the widows and families of those men who did not return.

And the Promise is still kept today, widened to include the families of those who returned damaged and traumatised from all theatres of war and the peacekeeping missions in which Australia has been involved.

**Legacy Week** had it's origins in a War Orphans Appeal which started in 1942 for financial support for the widows and orphans of those who did not return.

# COUNTRY FOOTY NETBALL FINALS KICKSTART WITH NEW GRANTS

As community winter sports players head towards finals season, the Andrews Labor Government is backing home-grown football and netball teams with more grants to upgrade local facilities across Victoria.

Member for Ripon Martha Haylett has welcomed Minister for Community Sport Ros Spence's announcement that the 2023-24 Country Football and Netball Program is now open for applications.

Grants of up to \$250,000 are available to make more sport infrastructure developments possible including court and oval lighting upgrades, changeroom developments and new pavilions for local clubs and communities.

This funding helps more clubs make important upgrades to facilities to ensure more players, coaches, umpires, and supporters of all abilities can get involved in local sport. Local footy and netball clubs in eligible areas are encouraged to speak to their local councils to apply for program funding.

Member for Ripon Martha Haylett said, "Sporting clubs are the heart of our rural and regional communities – it's important they are accessible for all and suitable for use for our players, coaches, umpires and supporters."

"I know so many of our beloved football and netball clubs are eager to do some much-needed repairs to their courts, ovals, pavilions and changerooms. I have written to all our clubs in Ripon encouraging them to apply for this funding."

Previous successful projects in Ripon include \$185,500 for brand new oval lighting at the Newlyn Recreation Reserve.

The Victorian Budget 2023/24 is providing more than \$213 million to deliver new and improved community sport infrastructure and support initiatives that boost participation and inclusion in local sports clubs and organisations.

The Program is a partnership with the AFL, AFL Victoria, and Netball Victoria. Since 2005, more than \$37.5 million has been invested in more than 560 projects across the state.

It's also part of the more than \$1.9 billion the Labor Government has invested in community sport and recreation infrastructure since 2014.



Students learn about safe road environments, safe vehicles and explore the impacts of crash forces. Students also test their knowledge of road safety issues like speed, drink driving and distractions.

From Mrs. Bourke	Week 7 in 5-6 we will be completing some post-camp Sovereign Hill activities, analysing texts, and continuing to develop and improve our persuasive essays. We'll shift our maths focus to 3D shape and angles, through which we'll practice some maths processes, such as addition and subtraction. If you have a deck of cards at home, please challenge your child to a game of 'Target 36' so they can continue to develop their understanding of Order of Operations. # Be wary of electrical fire risk in the home

Victoria's fire services are calling on households to keep the safety and maintenance of their electrical equipment and appliances front of mind following a recent clothes dryer fire which destroyed a home.

Firefighters responded to the dryer fire in Berwick which started in the middle of the night. Thankfully the three residents escaped unharmed, but firefighters worked for 30 minutes to control the blaze, which had extended through the roof space and quickly engulfed the whole house.

Once a house fire starts it can spread rapidly and engulf your home in a matter of minutes. By adopting fire-safe habits and reducing potential hazards there is a lot you can do to protect yourself and the people you live with.

In an average year, Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) and Country Fire Authority (CFA) respond to more than 3,000 residential fire incidents across the state. Too many of which are preventable.

Fire Rescue Victoria Commissioner Gavin Freeman, AFSM said Victorians should be wary of overloaded power boards, phone and laptop chargers and electric blankets.

"Electrical hazards in the home are a common cause for house fires these days, but you can greatly reduce your risk by taking some simple safety measures," Commissioner Freeman AFSM said.

"Make sure you're not overloading power boards. Don't leave your phone charging overnight. And never put electrical appliances like hair straighteners and laptops on soft surfaces.

"Take the time to service your ducted heating and clean your range hood and oven regularly, prevention is the best policy when it comes to fire safety."

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said the Berwick dryer fire is a relatable reminder to residents to check their appliances are in good working order

with good air flow around them.

"Using damaged or faulty electrical equipment and appliances can result in a fire, so please, play it safe, and only use certified electrical tradespeople to repair faulty appliances," CO Heffernan said.

"No one thinks a house fire is going to happen to them, but CFA attended 137 electrical fires last year and we've already responded to 84 this year."

"To prevent a fire from igniting, take the time to check your home office is set up safely, with Government no loose cables,





overloaded power boards or double adaptors and switch off any appliances at the wall when they're not being used."

For as little as \$20, households can help safeguard their homes and loved ones by purchasing and installing affordable smoke alarms in all bedrooms, hallways and living areas.

### Remember, for electrical appliances:

- Using damaged electrical equipment and appliances can result in a fire. Only use appliances in good working order.
- Turn off all electrical appliances at the power point when not in use and ensure your home office is set up safely.
- Don't use double adaptors.
- Only use power boards according to manufacturers' instructions, never overload or have loose cables, and check regularly for damage.
- Ensure monitors, laptops, televisions and other equipment have good air flow around them and are not in confined spaces or covered.
- Only use certified electrical trades people to repair damaged/faulty electrical appliances, wiring or equipment.
- Do not charge electrical devices like phones and laptops on soft surfaces such as couches and beds.
- If you are going away on holiday, make sure to turn off power to electrical appliances and let a neighbour know you are away.





# Dangerous Cypress trees to be removed in Snake Valley

Pyrenees Shire Council has announced plans to remove several cypress trees from the Smythesdale-Snake Valley Road, just east of the primary school.

These ageing trees are in poor health and pose a danger to community safety.

The threat of falling limbs is a hazard for school children who use the footpath daily, buildings on private property nearby and road users who drive or park under the trees.

Council acknowledges that the trees also provide shade and contribute to the amenity of the streetscape, which many residents value highly. While this is an important consideration, the safety of members of the community has been prioritized in making this decision.

Following a recent storm, for example, one tree had to be completely removed and many other trees suffered multiple broken limbs.



An assessment of this tree revealed the structural integrity of the tree was compromised with significant decay and dry rot. It is highly likely neighbouring trees would also be suffering similar deterioration.

Council regularly prunes the trees in an attempt to keep the avenue safe for the local community, but the cost to maintain these trees in a safe and healthy condition has become difficult to justify.

While no firm date has yet been set for the removal of the trees, Pyrenees Shire Council CEO Jim Nolan says Council aims to complete the works during school holidays.

"The road will need to be closed while we remove these trees, so we are looking to schedule the works during school holidays to keep disruption to a minimum," Mr Nolan said.

"Council has an annual tree planting program designed to improve our streetscapes by planting more appropriate species, and we will talk to local residents about future tree planting in Snake Valley.

"As well as keeping the community safe, removing these trees will allow for future investment in the area for the benefit of school users and local residents."
