<u>Important Notice</u> VICTORIAN ELECTORAL COMMISSION

Act on Penalty Reminder Notice or Risk Enforcement Action

Victorians who have an outstanding fine for failing to vote in the 2022 State election are urged to act before the matter is referred to Fines Victoria.

Victorians who failed to vote in the November 2022 State election will start receiving a penalty reminder notice this week, which carries a fee of \$27.70 in addition to the original \$92 fine.

Electoral Commissioner, Sven Bluemmel, advised recipients of a penalty reminder notice to act as soon as possible.

'If you receive a penalty reminder notice in the mail, you have 3 options: pay the fine, request an internal review, or elect to go to court,' Mr Bluemmel said.

Please get in touch with us as once we hand it over to Fines Victoria for enforcement action it's out of our hands.'

Non-voters have 28 days to respond to the penalty reminder notice. The Victorian Electoral Commission encourages people who are unsure what to do, or who require assistance throughout any stage of the infringements process, to call 1300 551 575 or visit vec.vic.gov.au/voting/finesand-reviews

GOLDEN PLAINS SHIRE COUNCIL HAVE YOUR SAY ON COUNCIL'S ELECTION PERIOD POLICY

At its August Meeting, Golden Plains Shire Council resolved to put the draft Election Period Policy out for public exhibition for residents to have their say.

This important policy outlines the procedures and guidelines for Council operations during election periods, ensuring Council can continue to conduct business throughout this period in a fair, transparent and equitable manner.

The community is invited to actively participate in the public consultation process by sharing their thoughts and suggestions on

the proposed changes. The draft policy will be available for public exhibition for a duration of four weeks, from 25 August 2023 to 22 September 2023.

According to section 69 of the Local Government Act 2020, Council is mandated to adopt an Election Period policy. The updated policy reflects the dates of the upcoming 2024 election and incorporates minor adjustments to align with the Local Government Act 2020 and enhance overall governance.

Mayor Brett Cunningham encourages all residents to engage in the consultation process and contribute their valuable insights to shape the policy effectively.

"Your input matters, and we're committed to ensuring a comprehensive and inclusive policy that truly represents the interests of our community," Cr Cunningham said.

Following the public exhibition period, Council will carefully consider all feedback received and any necessary changes will be discussed during the September meeting. The adopted Election Period Policy will play a pivotal role in shaping the democratic process for the upcoming 2024 election, with the election period commencing on September 24, 2024, and concluding on election day, being October 26, 2024.

CFA is ready for fire season

– but are you?

Victoria is expecting a warmer spring and an earlier start to the fire season this year and we're asking those living in high-risk areas to take action to prepare their family and property.

The new Spring Seasonal Outlook released yesterday predicts the fire risk in the coming months to be normal across the state, as well as strong drying patterns in Gippsland's forested areas and elevated grass fuel loads in central, western and northern Victoria.

While La Niña conditions have subdued Victoria's fire risk the past three years, our state is one of the most bush-fire prone areas in the world and we need people to be prepared as we approach warmer conditions.

CFA crews have been protecting lives and property in this environment for decades – some for more than a century.

They're highly trained, professional firefighters that have made every effort to prepare their communities ahead of this fire season, as they do every year.

We're constantly working with our Victorian emergency service partners throughout the cooler months to prepare for fire season and this year is no exception.

However, while we continue our work, our crews implore people to understand that fire safety is a shared responsibility between fire services and the community.

We're asking all Victorians in high-risk areas to take simple actions to prepare their family and property as the weather begins to warm.

If you live near areas with bush, forest, long grass or coastal scrub, these actions and decisions may well save your life and property in the event of a bushfire.

Find some time to sit down with your family or household and make a Bushfire Survival Plan, and if you already have one, it's a great time to review it.

It's also the perfect time to tidy up your property, this can include clearing your gutters, pruning branches away from your roof or walls, keeping grass shorter than



10cm and removing leaves and twigs from around your property.

Landowners should also consider private burn offs to remove green waste ahead of Fire Danger Period (FDP) declarations.

All burn-offs must be registered, which can be done online at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au.

Stay informed by downloading the VicEmergency app to stay across incidents and fire danger ratings in your area.



BERRYBANK WIND FARM COMMUNITY GRANTS AWARDED TO SIX COMMUNITY GROUPS

The latest round of Berrybank Wind Farm Community Grants has been awarded to six community groups who will share in a combined \$115,000 over the next three years to help deliver a range of community projects and events.

The funding was available across two categories: Economic Development, Tourism Projects and Events, and Community Projects and Events over \$10,000, with one off and recurring funding available.

The successful community projects and events included:

- Shelford Duck Race \$10,100 total to be delivered over the next three years to support Shelford's largest community event.
- **Bunjil Lookout Community Gathering** \$13,800 over the next three years for the Maude She Oaks and Steiglitz Community Planning Group to support the community event following a successful pilot event in 2022.
- Shelford Public Hall Rejuvenation Project \$49,700 over the next two years for the Shelford Public Hall Reserve Committee of Management to support rejuvenation of this valuable community asset.
- Valentines Bush Dance and Winter Solstice Bonfire \$15,850 over the next three years for Cape Clear Recreation Reserve to help run these annual events.
- **Greens Lighting Upgrade** \$15,700 for Inverleigh Bowls Club to support an upgrade to LED lighting and improve visibility over the playing surface.
- **Spectator Shelter** \$10,000 for the Inverleigh Sporting Complex to support its spectator shelter project.

Golden Plains Shire Mayor Cr Brett Cunningham said the Berrybank Wind Farm Community Grants continued to provide vital funding to support local community projects and events across the Shire.

Delivered in partnership with Berrybank Development Pty Ltd, the Berrybank Wind Farm Community Grants Program provides funding opportunities to support local events and projects in Golden Plains. Applications were open from 1 June until 30 June 2023.

The Berrybank Wind Farm Community Grants Committee,

made of representatives of the company, Golden Plains Shire Council and members of the community, provide advice on the criteria for awarding community grants, evaluate applications from the public and make recommendations to Council on which local projects to support.

The funding contribution for 2023 was \$60,000 and will increase to \$102,500 annually from 2024. There will be a minimum of one round of application opportunities each year and funding will be made available over the 15-year term of the agreement between Council and Berrybank Development Pty Ltd.



Roadside grazing period to start next month

Corangamite Shire farmers are encouraged to apply for roadside grazing permits so their livestock can reduce fire hazards by eating the grass down as conditions dry out in summer.

Council Coordinator Community Safety and Resilience Belinda Bennett said roadside grazing was permissible under the local law between 1 September 2023 and 30 April 2024, provided no protected native vegetation was present.

"Grazing reduces fire risk on roadsides over the fire season, but a local laws permit is required," Ms Bennett said.

"Council officers assess applications for grazing permits to determine the suitability of the road for grazing, which is not permitted in high conservation areas.

Stock are only allowed to graze on roadsides during daylight and owners are required to put up a temporary electric fence for safety."

Roadside grazing isn't permitted during the winter months because hooves compact wet soil, causing pugging, erosion and loss of vegetation. It is the permit holder's responsibility to make sure the roadside is not grazed when wet and pugging is likely to occur. If conditions are wet, some permit holders may need to delay the start of their roadside grazing program.

Ms Bennett said roadside grazing season was also a good reminder for landholders to check their boundary fences to ensure the livestock are contained to their property.

"Wandering livestock can pose a significant risk to road users," she said.

"Under the local laws, landholders must ensure that fences are adequate to prevent the escape of livestock and must not allow livestock to wander on a road."

Penalties can apply for failing to contain livestock and Council has powers under the Impounding Livestock Act 1994 to impound livestock found wandering. Residents who see wandering stock on roads should immediately report it to the relevant authority:

For local roads, contact Council's Local Laws team on 5593 7100

• For main roads, contact VicRoads on 13 11 70.

• Both agencies provide a 24/7 response service for wandering livestock on roads. For further information on roadside grazing permits or to apply, visit

"This is the second year of the Berrybank Wind Farm Community Grants Program and it's clear that these funding opportunities give local community groups and organisations a real boost in making important events and initiatives a reality," Cr Cunningham said.

"Congratulations to the latest round of successful recipients, and Council looks forward to working with Berrybank over the coming years as they deliver more funding for exciting community projects and events."

The broader Ballarat area has received seven new Heavy Tankers as part of the rollout of 50 new tankers across the state.



The Minister for Emergency Services today visited the Buninyong Fire Station with CFA Chief

Officer Jason Heffernan to officially handover the new District 15 resources.

The new Heavy Tankers will go to the brigades of Ballan, Buninyong-Mt Helen, Creswick,

Daylesford, Miners Rest, Napoleons-Enfield and Wendouree and the Ultra-heavy Tanker will be

housed at Ballarat City Fire Station.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said these new state-of-the-art assets are a welcome

addition to District 15 ahead of summer.

"The Heavy Tankers feature a 15-tonne crewcab chassis with a 4000-water litre tank,

electronic monitors and electric rewind hose reels," CO Heffernan said.

their water storage capability."

The Ultra Heavy Tankers have the capacity to carry 10,000 litres of water. Heavy Tankers can

carry 4,000 litres.

Ballarat City Fire Brigade is the second of 29 brigades state-wide to receive one of the new

Ultra Heavy Tankers. The first appliance was allocated to Berriwillock, near Swan Hill.

District 15 consists of 62 brigades. The seven brigades receiving the heavy tankers are supported

by 471 volunteers that have responded to almost 570 incidents since the beginning of the year.




