

MONTH-LONG YOUTH FEST CELEBRATION KICKS OFF

The skills and achievements of young Victorians will be celebrated with a month-long festival, supported by the Andrews Labor Government.

Minister for Youth Natalie Suleyman joined Member for Preston Nathan Lambert to launch Youth Fest – a program of 111 events being held right across Victoria throughout September.

From live music, art and filmmaking to sustainable gardening, Youth Fest 2023 is supported by the Labor Government and features events designed for and by young Victorians.

Grants of \$2,000 have been awarded to youth sector organisations, local government, and schools to develop events in partnership with Victorians aged 12 to 25.

Troubling data shows Victorians won't leave early in the event of a bushfire An alarming number of Victorians living in high-risk bushfire Skipton areas say they would stay at their properties until they felt threatened by a bushfire, or would wait for an official warning, a CFA survey revealed. Spring CFA's annual Bushfire Community Survey, undertaken since 2009-10, showed 30.9% would wait for emergency authorities to tell them what to do, 28.6% would stay until they felt threatened and 13.8% would stay and defend their property. Victorian fire agencies and regulator urge caution over lithium -ion battery fire risks

Victorian fire services are responding to at least one significant lithium-ion battery-related fire each week and this trend is expected to increase.

Energy Safe Victoria, Country Fire Authority (CFA) and Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) are urging the community to be aware of risks associated with lithium-ion batteries and know how to use them safely, with fires caused by them on the rise.

Lithium-ion batteries are rechargeable batteries found in e-scooters, e-cigarettes, e-bikes, electric vehicles, golf buggies, power banks, vacuum cleaners, power tools and gardening appliances.

CFA Deputy Chief Officer Garry Cook said lithiumion battery fires can be avoided by taking precautions and using these devices safely.

"When lithium-ion batteries are damaged, misused or fail to meet compliance standards, they pose a serious fire risk, particularly while they are connected to chargers," he said.

"These devices make our lives easier, however people should know the risks and make sure they use e-products correctly.

"The best way to keep you and your family safe is to only purchase from reputable suppliers, follow the manufacturer's instructions and use the compatible charger that came with the product."

Fire Rescue Commissioner Gavin Freeman AFSM said fire crews were responding to an increasing number of fires caused by lithium-ion batteries, often with devastating impacts.

"Just last month FRV attended a significant house fire in Port Melbourne caused by a handheld rechargeable tool, which had a faulty lithium-ion battery," Commissioner Freeman said.

"Thankfully the occupant managed to evacuate the premise and was uninjured, but the house was extensively damaged."

"It's important that people never store e-products in places that would block exits in the event of a fire."

"Stop using or charging the product if you notice strong odours, extreme heat, change in shape, leaking or hissing and popping sounds, as these are indicators the product may catch alight."

Once a lithium-ion battery catches alight it can develop dangerous, self-sustaining flames and potentially release shrapnel and toxic gas.

Fire agencies encourage people to charge these devices in a safe open space outside or in a room where a smoke alarm is present.

The issue has prompted Energy Safe to include the supply of safe lithium-ion batteries as a compliance and enforcement priority for 2023-24, ensuring suppliers sell products that meet Australian Standards.

Energy Safe has also led the expansion of international safety standards for personal e-transporters, such as electric scooters powered by rechargeable batteries.

Energy Safe CEO Leanne Hughson said one of the biggest risk factors was the use

of 'aftermarket' batteries or those not made by the original manufacturer.

"All batteries come with a degree of risk but it's how you treat them and the care you take with purchasing that determines whether they become dangerous," she said.

"If they're damaged, replace them and don't take shortcuts to save some money. Common factors with lithium-ion fires are aftermarket, recycled or modified batteries.

"They may be cheaper, but they are not worth the risk. You want the safest option which is the battery that is built by the same manufacturer as the product. It's the same principle with chargers – do not buy the cheapest charger you can find unless it's made by the manufacturer of the product.

"Riding an electric scooter should be a fun pastime, not an imminent fire hazard."

Victorians who own or are considering purchasing a lithium-ion battery powered product can take the following actions to keep themselves and their families safe:

- Purchase products from reputable suppliers.
- Only use chargers and cords that are supplied with the device.
- Don't modify or tamper with the batteries and the appliances they power.
- Don't leave batteries charging in direct sunlight or for longer than they need to.
- Only charge batteries on non-combustible surfaces in a room where a smoke alarm is present.
- Don't use batteries or devices that show signs of swelling, bulging, leaking or overheating.
- Don't charge items close to a door, which would block your exit if the item did catch fire.

If your e-product does catch fire:

- Call Triple Zero (000) immediately.
- Stop using the product if you notice overheating, bulging, leaking or unusual sounds.
- Leave the area and call Triple Zero (000), even if you no longer see flames or smoke.
- It's not safe to attempt to put the fire out yourself, as batteries involved in fire can release toxic gases and generate multiple explosions.
- Ensure firefighters attend to make the area safe.
- Never throw lithium-ion batteries in your regular waste or recycling collection bins. Many battery related fires start in household bins, garbage trucks and waste facilities.

FEEDBACK SOUGHT ON ROADSIDE WEEDS AND PESTS CONTROL PLAN Golden Plains Shire Council is dedicated to managing roadside weed and pest issues and is actively seeking input from the community for the creation of its Roadside Weeds and Pests Control Plan 2023-2026 (the Plan).

The Plan will assist Council to identify the prevalent weed and pest species along Council's roadsides to enable the implementation of appropriate measures by Council officers.

Community feedback is vital in shaping this Plan, ensuring that it aligns with local priorities and concerns.

Council's Roadside Weed Control program is part of a broader state-wide initiative aimed at preventing the spread of invasive weeds and pests on rural roads.

Golden Plains Shire Mayor Cr Brett Cunningham welcomed the development of the Plan, emphasising its importance in controlling invasive weed throughout the Shire's roadsides.

"I encourage residents from all across the Shire to consider their local roadsides and identify any invasive weeds and pests that may be affecting the native flora and fauna across our Shire," Cr Cunningham said.

"Council is committed to tackling invasive weeds and pests, which change the natural diversity and balance of ecological communities, threatening the survival of many native plants and animals," he said.

"Contributions from Council's roadside weed control program has so far seen roadside weed control of more than 1600 kilometres of the Shire's roadsides, a number we aim to keep growing."

The Roadside Weeds and Pests Control Plan is funded by a \$49,128 grant from the Victorian Government's Roadside Weeds and Pests Program.



CFA members climb to new heights for mental health

Up to 700 participating Victorian and interstate emergency services members climbed the stairs of Crown Metropol in Melbourne today, to raise money and awareness for mental health and cancer research.

The 10th annual Melbourne Firefighter Stair Climb, organised by the 000Foundation, raised a total of more than \$605,000.

This year's beneficiaries are Lifeline, Peter MacCallum Cancer Foundation and 000Foundation.

The challenge saw firefighters get into 25kg of protective gear and race up 28 floors of the tower one-by-one.

CFA Deputy Chief Officer Garry Cook said it's positive to see emergency services personnel come together in person to support such a worthwhile cause.

"Our members are enthusiastic participants of this event and it's great to see their contributions make a difference by raising money and awareness for mental health programs and cancer research," he said.

Firefighters and emergency personnel from all over Australia flocked to Melbourne to be part of the stair climb.

CFA firefighters climbed alongside members from FRV, FFMVic, Victoria Police, VICSES, Ambulance Victoria and members from Tasmania, New South Wales, South Australia and New Zealand.

The Bureau's long-range forecast for spring 2023 shows below average rainfall is likely for most of Australia with warmer than along usual temperatures.

The warmer spring forecast comes as winter 2023 looks to be Australia's warmest winter on record.

The national mean temperature for winter is currently tracking to be 1.54°C above the 1961-1990 average, which would make it Australia's warmest winter since 1996.

Bureau of Meteorology climate services manager Dr Karl Braganza said unusually warm days are likely for almost all areas over spring, especially Western Australia and parts of the south-east.

"Spring is forecast to be warmer than usual across the country," he said.

Dr Braganza said there is a significant contrast in climatic conditions this spring compared to last year when Australia had its second-wettest spring on record.

"This spring, the forecast shows most areas have a high chance of below average rainfall, and many areas have an increased chance of an unusually dry spring,' he said.

Areas with the highest chance of an unusually dry spring are the south-west and parts of the east.

There is always the risk of dangerous and destructive fires in Australia during spring.

Australia's fire agencies have identified an increased risk of fire this spring for regions in New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia and the Northern Territory as part of their Spring 2023 Bushfire Outlook.

Communities in these regions are urged to prepare and review their bushfire plans.

Other areas have normal fire risk.

Dr Braganza said: "The recent wildfires in Canada and Hawaii underscore risks that Australians are familiar with, in particular the catastrophic potential of fires that can occur near urban areas during periods of low rainfall."

Springtime also sees the beginning of northern Australia's wet season in October. The first significant rains of this northern wet season are likely to be later than usual for northern areas.

Climate influences on the spring long-range forecast include the possibility of an El Niño forming this year, with the Bureau currently at El Niño Alert.

When El Niño Alert criteria have been met in the past, an El Niño event has developed around 70% of the time.

Bureau of Meteorology senior climatologist Catherine Ganter said climate models also showed a positive Indian Ocean Dipole event is likely to form during spring.

"This increases our chances of below average rainfall for much of south-eastern and central Australia," she said.

"If a positive IOD occurs with an El Niño, the drying effect is typically stronger and more widespread across Australia, compared to either event by themselves."

Global sea surface temperatures have been the highest

on record for the months of April to July 2023.

The oceans play an extremely important role in global climate, including the climate of Australia.

Bureau of Meteorology senior hydrologist Dr Masoud Edraki said the global climate system is looking very unusual right now.

"Record high warm sea surface temperatures in all of the global oceans are likely to continue to impact the weather we experience for many months," he said.

"We know that a warmer climate does increase the risk of extreme weather including heatwaves and drought," he said.

"We are already seeing longer fire seasons, and an increase in the number of dangerous fire weather days over most of Australia."

"We don't know yet how global warming, and particularly the increased warmth in the oceans, is affecting our typical climate drivers. We'll continue to monitor this closely and how it is likely to affect Australia's climate forecast."

"Our climate forecast model is consistent with the international climate forecasts that show Australia is trending dry and warm for the coming season, particularly in the south-west and much of southeastern Australia."
