

### Keep your dog confined to keep it

Is your dog lonely, bored or in CORANGAMITE need of an adventure? Dogs SHIRE are highly social animals which is why they make great additions to our households.

Many, however, are left alone all day while their families are at work and school, so can be tempted to escape looking for company.

Many are also adventurous and need plenty of exercise so without regular walks outside their yard, they can roam.

Corangamite Shire Council is calling on dog owners to make sure their pets are restrained in a properly fenced area and suitably cared for so

they don't stray.



Community Safety and Resilience Coordinator Belinda Bennett said dogs need regular socialisation with people and other animals to keep them physically and mentally healthy.

"Recently we've seen an increase in the number of reports of dogs at large. Since the start of the year, we've impounded 63 dogs.

"Containing your dog is the best way that you can keep you dog safe from hazards such as traffic and fights with other dogs.

A dog of any size or breed can become aggressive when defending its territory. Even a friendly dog may guard the area on or around its property.

"Most dog attacks in public places occur on the footpath or great way to spotlight a fantastic part of the world. road in front of the attacking dog's property."

Ms Bennett said keeping dogs confined also helped reduce dog droppings in public areas creating a healthier and more enjoyable environment for everyone.

She reminded owners that all dogs and cats must be registered and microchipped so they can be returned home as soon as possible if they do get out.

"Under the Domestic Animals Act 1994, owners must ensure that their dog is securely confined to their premise.

"If a dog is found wandering, Council can fine the owner and hold the dog at a pound, at the owner's cost, until works are done to confine the dog."





As the vibrant colours of Spring paint our beloved Golden Plains with renewed energy and enthusiasm, I am thrilled to connect with you through the pages of your local community newsletter.

Our community is the heart and soul of Golden Plains. As the season changes, so too do the opportunities for growth and progress within our Shire. It's my privilege to share with you some of the exciting developments on the horizon.

We're committed to enhancing our infrastructure to meet the evolving needs of our residents. In the coming months we will embark on several key projects, including road improvements, expanded recreational facilities, and enhancements to public spaces that will make Golden Plains an attractive place to live, visit and socialise.

The recent Victorian Government announcement to deliver a multimillion-dollar pipeline of early childhood infrastructure projects in Golden Plains Shire has brought tremendous excitement to families with young children in our community. The initial phase of the Building Blocks Partnership is set to allocate up to \$5 million for kindergarten projects in Haddon and Bannockburn, resulting in the creation of approximately 140 additional early education places starting from early 2024.

For Peri Urban Councils like Golden Plains, meeting community expectations would be a challenging feat without the invaluable support of the Victorian State Government. We extend our gratitude to them for their ongoing funding commitments to expand these crucial kindergarten places.

In our continuous effort to support families, Council has partnered with community organisations to provide essential parenting programs including Circle of Security and Bringing Up Great Kids. These programs are tailored to the needs of young children and adolescents. If you are a parent, caregiver or guardian, we encourage you to visit goldenplains.vic.gov. au/events to see what's on offer throughout October.

On Tuesday 12 September, Minister for Early Childhood Education and Pre-Prep Ingrid Stitt announced a Building Blocks Partnership with Golden Plains Shire, which includes up to \$5 million for two modular kindergarten projects, creating up to 140 new places for local children to attend kindergarten.

The partnership includes an expansion to the Haddon Pre-School Centre, and an expansion of the sessional kindergarten facilities at the Bannockburn Family Services Centre.

Additionally, Council has arranged a diverse array of events for senior residents to enjoy as part of the 2023 Victorian Seniors Festival in October. There's still plenty of opportunities for participation, including day trips, open days and arts and crafts activities. Feel free to call 5220 7151 to get involved and make the most of these festivities.

Lastly, we are pleased to announce that nominations are now open for the Golden Plains Shire Council Community Awards 2023. # Free green waste disposal helps fire preparation

Two weather systems – El Niño and a positive Indian Ocean Dipole – will mean hotter and drier conditions over spring and summer, leading to a higher fire risk.

CORANGAMITE

In addition, recent wet conditions have increased grass growth, so there is a higher risk of grassfires coming into summer.

Corangamite Shire Council is offering free domestic green waste disposal to Shire residents from Saturday 14 October to Sunday 5 November to help community members get ready for fire season.

In addition, kerbside collection customers can jump-start their fire safety clean-ups thanks to extra FOGO bin pickups.

The green-lidded Food Organics and Garden Organics bins will be collected weekly, instead of fortnightly, from Monday 9 October until the end of the year.

Community Safety and Resilience Coordinator Belinda Bennett said non-commercial customers could drop off green waste at the Naroghid Landfill and all Shire transfer stations.

"The free green waste drop off is to encourage residents to clean up their properties in preparation for the fire season," Ms Bennett said.

"It's shaping up to be a drier and hotter season earlier, so we will really need to have fire risks reduced as we come into the fire danger period.

"Things are still quite green, but it only takes two weeks of hot, dry weather for green vegetation to become a serious hazard.

"Preparation is the key. Now is the time to reduce fuel loads by managing grass growth and cleaning up bark, twigs, leaves and other organic matter around your property.

"Clean dead leaves out of your gutters and off roofs, and get rid of dry grass, leaves, twigs and bark that can build up in corners or under steps and decks.

"Cut back branches overhanging your home and prune lower ones to create separation from ground vegetation.

"Normally a heaped trailer or ute load of green waste would cost \$38.80 to dispose of, so this is a great chance for people to clean-up around their properties for free."

"One overgrown block can pose a hazard to a whole neighbourhood so protect your home, and your neighbours, and clean up now."

Ms Bennett encouraged residents to have a fire plan and know what to do if there is a fire. "Now is the best time to understand your fire risk and get prepared, not when a fire starts," he said. "You can download a helpful guide from cfa.vic.gov.au/firereadykit

"We are looking to commence fire inspections in early October."

#### Free green waste disposal to get your home bushfire-ready

Two weather systems – El Niño and a positive Indian Ocean Dipole – will mean hotter and drier conditions over spring and summer, leading to a higher fire risk.

In addition, recent wet conditions have increased grass growth, so there is a higher risk of grassfires coming into summer.

Council is offering free domestic green waste disposal to Shire residents from Saturday 14 October to Sunday 5 November to help community members get ready for fire season.

Non-commercial customers could drop off green waste at the Naroghid Landfill and all Shire transfer stations.

Normally a heaped trailer or ute load of green waste would cost \$38.80 to dispose of, so this is a great chance to clean up your property for free. In addition, kerbside collection customers can jump-start their fire safety clean-ups thanks to extra FOGO bin pick-ups.

The green-lidded Food Organics and Garden Organics bins will be collected weekly, instead of fortnightly, from Monday 9 October until the end of the year.

# Victoria's fire season set to begin

The start date for this year's Victorian fire season has been set by fire authorities, following a hotter and drier start to spring and warmer conditions ahead.

CFA declared the first **Fire Danger Period (FDP)** for the 2023-34 fire season, commencing on **Monday, 9 October** for the **Wellington** and **East Gippsland Shire Councils**.

The predicted El Niño weather pattern means Victorians can expect a hotter and drier summer than recent years, and communities should begin preparing their properties and creating a Bushfire Survival Plan.

CFA will be introducing further FDPs for Victorian municipalities in the coming months, based on assessments of the amount of rain, grassland curing rate and local conditions.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said the FDP declaration is earlier this year which is an indication of what we can expect for the summer ahead.

"While crews are ready to respond and support communities this bushfire season, fire safety is a shared responsibility and we ask Victorians to prepare and know their local risks," he said.

"We are asking anyone burning off in the next two weeks before the official FDP begins to be very careful.

"Take this opportunity ahead of the FDP to clean up your property, prepare your bushfire plan with your family and download the VicEmergency app."

Deputy CFA Chief Officer South East Trevor Owen said we're really conscious of the increasing dry conditions Wellington and East Gippsland Shires as a result reduced of rainfall during Winter and now Spring.

With increased day and night temperatures and low rainfall than

average forecast over coming months, the timing for the early introduction of the Fire Danger Period is necessary.

Those conducting burn-offs must notify authorities online at the Fire Permits Victoria website (www.firepermits.vic.gov.au), or by calling ESTA on 1800 668 511.

By registering your burn-off online, you allow emergency call takers to allocate more of their time taking calls from people who need emergency assistance immediately.

No burning off is permitted during the FDP without a Permit to Burn, which can be applied for through the Fire Permits Victoria website.

Fire Danger Period information:

- A written permit is required to burn off grass, undergrowth, weeds or other vegetation during the FDP. You can apply for a permit at firepermits.vic.gov.au.
- Lighting fires in the open without a permit can bring a penalty of more than \$21,800 and/or 12 months imprisonment. For a full list of conditions, visit cfa.vic.gov.au/can.

#### HAY SEASON TO START EARLY IN STATE'S WEST AND CENTRAL DISTRICTS

An earlier hay season has Victorian farmers and CFA talking about the dangers of high moisture content in hay as they begin cutting, baling and storing it in warmer conditions.

Although we have endured wetter than usual summers over the last three years, CFA still responded to almost 52 haystack related fires between 1 July 2022 and 30 June 2023.

Confirmation from the BOM to El Nino conditions, and a positive phasing to the Indian Ocean Diploe, hotter and drier forecasts are expected, which means this year's agricultural activities are set to kick off a lot sooner and have elevated risks of fire ignition and spread.

With hay season running around three weeks ahead of time, and farmers in the West starting to bale their hay in late September, early October, farmers and CFA are calling on everyone to be attuned to the risks of spontaneous combustion.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said if hay is baled with high moisture content and is green, it can heat up like compost, which can lead to spontaneous combustion weeks or months later.

"Farmers who have decided to carry on with hay production need to be extra vigilant this year to make sure conditions are right for making hay and for the future storage and transport as well," he said.

"Hay fires are a real threat to properties and stock in primary production areas.

"Whether you're a seasoned hay grower or switching to hay this year, it's imperative to take care of your hay and crops this fire season.

"Consider the storage of your hay to avoid spontaneous combustion which can lead to ignition."

When hay is either not properly cured and dried out before baling, or not stored to protect it from rain or damp conditions, moisture content in the bales is then higher than the recommended level.

If stored in environments with high temperatures and little airflow, a biological reaction could lead to a fire.

# Haystack fires can also start easily from lightning strikes or sparks from equipment.

- "You should regularly monitor your haystacks by using a temperature probe or a crowbar to detect heating hay.
- "Signs of heating hay can include steam rising from the stack or unusual odours like burning, must, pipe tobacco smell or a caramel smell.

 "By being vigilant, you're protecting yourself from the financial impact of losing valuable fodder and protecting your property and family from the potential danger of hay fires."

#### **Haystack Tips**

- Ensure hay is well cured before baling.
- Know the history of the hay you purchase.
- Monitor moisture and temperature of your hay regularly.
- Watch for unusual odours such as pipe tobacco, caramel, burning or musty smells.
- Store hay in separate stacks or sheds away from farm equipment and other buildings.
- Keep your hay dry. Protect it from rain, leaking rooves or spouts, and runoff. Cover stacks with tarps or hay caps.
- Don't stack hay right to the top of a hay shed.
   Allow some air to circulate at the top this helps to carry away moisture.

Temperature Guide – what to do when your hay is overheating Use a thermometer in a probe or insert a crowbar into the middle of the stack for 2 hours.

- Less than 50°C Can handle the crowbar without discomfort. Check temperature daily.
- • 50°C 60°C Can only handle crowbar for short time. Check temperature twice daily.
- • 60°C 70°C Can touch bar only briefly. Check temperature every 2 4 hours. Move hay to improve air flow.
- Over 70 °C Bar is too hot to hold Potential for fire. Call 000 immediately. Avoid walking on top of haystack. At this stage pulling apart the hay may provide the oxygen it needs to ignite.

# Don't get stuck on hold, register your burn-off online

As hundreds of thousands of Victorians begin preparing their property for fire season, emergency services are encouraging landowners to register any planned burn-offs online, through the Fire Permits Victoria website.

Landowners will be looking to take advantage of the coming long weekend and spring conditions, ahead of an earlier start to this year's fire season. Therefore, authorities expect a surge in burn-off registrations this weekend and over the coming weeks.

The quickest and easiest way to register your burnoff is by using the Fire Permits Victoria website at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au/notify.

ESTA's Chief Operating Officer Nicole Ashworth says while the burn-off registration phone line (1800 668 511) is still available, callers can experience long wait times on days of high demand.

"Using the Fire Permits Victoria website to register your burn-off also ensures ESTA's fire call takers can focus their efforts on taking emergency triple zero calls," she said.

"Earlier this year, we experienced days with more than 1200 non-emergency calls to register burn-offs on private land, so we're encouraging people to start pivoting to the easy-to-use Fire Permits Victoria website."

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said the Fire Permits Victoria website is the preferred platform for community members to register their burns.

"By registering your burn-off, it allows emergency services to verify the fire is a planned burn if Triple Zero (000) receive any good intent calls to report it as an actual fire," he said.

"Unregistered burns can lead to unnecessary call outs for your local fire brigade."


The website allows you to notify emergency services of your burn, and also check and apply for a permit, if necessary.

However, if your burn is taking place within the next two hours, you must register your burn via the phone line on 1800 668 511.

- Follow regulations or laws by CFA and local council.
- Notify your neighbours if the burn will generate fire and smoke.
- Check the weather conditions are safe to burn. Postpone your activity if high fire risk conditions develop.
- Establish a gap in vegetation or fire break of no less than three metres cleared of all flammable material.
- There are enough people to monitor, contain and extinguish the burn safely and effectively. Never leave a burn-off unattended.

# Prepare your property now for the Fire Danger Period

Pyrenees Shire Council is reminding residents to prepare their properties for summer as the weather quickly starts to warm up.

The Australasian Fire and Emergency Services Authorities Council (AFAC) released its seasonal bushfire outlook for spring this year, identifying an increased risk of bushfire for large areas of eastern and central Australia, including Victoria.

"With the weather so warm, there is a risk of the bushfire season starting early. We're also seeing lots of grass growth with the warm weather and light rains," said Pyrenees Shire Council Mayor Cr Ron Eason.

With the Bureau of Meteorology formally declaring Australia to now be in an El Nino event, a warmer spring and summer could mean a more dangerous bushfire season.

"El Nino coupled with the warmer than average winter we've had means we need to be preparing our properties a little sooner and keeping on top of that preparation.

"Remember to also review your fire survival plan and make sure your family knows how to follow this plan in case of fire," Cr Eason said.

Making sure your property is prepared before the Fire Danger Period is declared is important. You can make sure your property is ready for summer by

- keeping grass 10cm or shorter in length,
- Cleaning your gutters regularly,
- removing flammable items from decks and verandas,
- removing dry leaves, twigs and other fire

hazards,

 pruning shrubs and trees, and



 moving woodpiles away from your house.

Even if you don't live in the bush, your family and your home is still at risk of fire. Property owners can take advantage of free green waste disposal at all Council transfer stations when cleaning up.

"We have free green waste disposal for residents and ratepayers, making it easier to keep your property well maintained and fire ready," Cr Eason said.


Reducing the vegetation around your home will help keep you, your family, and the community safe. This your responsibility, and failure to remove a fire hazard on your property may result in Council issuing a fire hazard removal notices and fine.

"We take fire prevention seriously with our compliance team issuing over 600 fire prevention notices across the Shire last year. About 40 properties did not comply with the notice and so our team issued them with hefty fines.

"Of these, 15 matters were prosecuted in the Magistrates' Court and the court increased some of these fines significantly. We know how important it is to look our own safety and that of the Shire and we'd rather not have to remind you by issuing a fine or going to court," said Cr Eason.

# PROPOSED SPEED LIMIT CHANGES TO IMPROVE SAFETY

As part of Council's commitment to improve road safety for all road users and pedestrians in the Shire, we're seeking community feedback on a proposal to lower the speed limits on a number of roads across the Shire.

Following feedback from the community, Council is proposing to lower the speed limits on:

- Wilsons Road, Haddon Reduce the speed limit from 100 km/h to 80 km/h along the entire length of the road due to roadside hazards and residential properties.
- Teesdale-Inverleigh Road, Inverleigh Reduce the speed limit from 100 km/h to 80 km/h between 250m South of Jolly's Road and Hamilton Highway due to roadside hazards and the narrow road width, and 80 km/h to 60 km/h on approach into Teesdale township.
- Vaggs Road, Ross Creek Reduce existing speed limit of 100 km/h to 80 km/h for the 1730m stretch of road from Sebastopol-Smythesdale Road to Lacys Road.
- Bowes Road, Ross Creek Reduce existing speed limit of 100 km/h to 80 km/h for the 1870m stretch of road from Sebastopol-Smythesdale Road to School Lane.
- Scotchmans-Lead Road, Napoleons Reduce existing speed limit of 80 km/h to 60 km/h from 460 Scotchmans-Lead Road to the bridge (390 Scotchmans-Lead Road)
- Clyde Road, Bannockburn Reduce existing speed limit of 80 km/h to 60 km/h from Midland Highway to existing 60 km/h past Lowndes Road.
- Thomas Road, Haddon Reduce existing speed from limit of 60 km/h to 50 km/h for the full stretch of road.
- Kelly Road, Bannockburn Reduce existing speed limit of 80 km/hr to 60 km/hr from Midland Highway to existing 60 km/hr near to 75 Kelly Road.

Sebastopol-Smythesdale Road, Smythesdale – Reduce existing speed limit of 80 km/hr to 60 km/hr from Brooke Street to intersection of Pascoe Street and 100 km/hr to 80 km/hr from Ross Creek Road to Kirks Road.

Golden Plains Shire Mayor Cr Brett Cunningham encouraged the community to have their say on the proposed speed reductions.

"Council is continually looking to improve road user and pedestrian safety across the Shire and these speed limit

reductions are the next step to ensuring increased safety for all residents and visitors to the Shire," he said.

"I encourage all residents to review all roads with proposed speed limit changes and provide their valuable feedback for the safety and benefit of everyone in Golden Plains."
