Mayor Gstrein recognised for 20 years on Council

Corangamite Shire Mayor Ruth Gstrein was recognised at the Municipal Association of Victoria annual conference on Thursday night.

Cr Gstrein was presented with a Councillor Service Award for 20 years of dedication.

The Central Ward Councillor was first elected to Council in 2002, and was re-elected in 2004, 2008, 2012, 2016 and 2020. She has served two three-year stints as Mayor between, 2007-2009, then again from 2020.

She has also served as an MAV Board Director for 10 years, including as Deputy President (Rural).

"Having been part of six councils over the time, I have served alongside councillors who have always been focussed on progress and the wellbeing of Corangamite residents and businesses," she said.

"Previous Councillor Geoff Smith, who I had the pleasure of sitting beside for many years, was a great mentor, who always provided me with support and sound advice.

"I love local government and the ability to work closely with groups and the wider community to achieve their goals," Cr Gstrein said.

Cr Gstrein said highlights of her time on Council included



the Apex Park upgrade project, the launch and evolution of the Robert Burns Festival, construction of the Camperdown Stadium and Terang gym and most recently the new library service venture with Moyne Shire and the Twelve Apostles Trail.

"The Camperdown skate park was another terrific project. There were some really enthusiastic young people who got involved and helped with the planning and fundraising and then got to enjoy the fruits of their labour.

"It's never dull. Every day you have no idea of what could arise, who a phone call could come from, how big or small the issues are.

"To me all of these things are important, and I just enjoy being able to play my part.

"Organisation wise, I appreciate the amazing staff we have who do their best to deliver quality services and projects.

Cr Gstrein said her 20 years on Council had also had its challenges, notably COVID-19 and other natural disasters, meeting community expectations with limited finances, and cost-shifting from other tiers of government.

Despite ongoing advocacy, it was disheartening to see the continued deterioration of the State arterial road network, she said.

"Disaster recovery, particularly following floods and fires, has been an inspiration seeing the fantastic connections in our communities and the relationships we have built to support one another," she said.

"At the end of the day, I am one of seven within a team. I am grateful for the support given to me by my fellow councillors along with my incredible family Peter, Christopher and Lucy. I couldn't do this job without them."

The MAV Councillor Services Awards celebrate the achievements, commitment, and dedication of long-serving councillors across the state.

In all, 77 Councillors from across the state received Councillor Service Awards for 10, 15, 20 and 25 years and eight received Mayor Emeritus Awards for three terms leading their respective Councils.

MAV President, Cr David Clark, said serving one's community through your local council is a unique responsibility.

"Communities need dedicated individuals, like those receiving these awards, who are willing to give their time and energy to serve in the best interests of the people and their local communities," Cr Clark said.

"Being a councillor can sometimes be a thankless task. We think it's important, as the peak body for the local government sector, to provide this recognition."

"The MAV has the great privilege of seeing firsthand the hard work and hours dedicated councillors put into their role – often on top of their day job. It's a credit to all those receiving awards."

"Councils are proud to be part of their communities, they are the true local representatives. It's a great honour, but equally a responsibility I know all of these recipients take very seriously," Cr Clark said.

ROAD MAINTENANCE BLITZ KICKS OFF ACROSS REGIONAL VICTORIA

The Allan Labor Government has kicked off this year's road maintenance blitz – improving connections and making roads in every corner of Victoria safer for drivers, passengers and freight transport.

Between now and June 2024, with the winter over and conditions drying up, crews will be carrying out on-road repairs, inspecting and maintaining bridges, traffic lights and signage as well as controlling vegetation on roadsides to minimise bushfire risk on the state's road corridors.

Minister for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne said, "We've already made record investments in repairing and maintaining our state's roads – our new, long-term road maintenance plan will deliver even better-targeted works and improved outcomes for Victorians."

"We know we are facing a significant and complex repair program after some of the worst floods in our state's history – that's why our plan is backed by a long-term funding commitment and data-driven plan to fix our roads."

Most of this work will be delivered in regional Victoria, where flooding and extreme rainfall has caused the most widespread damage – as part of the first phase of a 10-year, \$6.6 billion maintenance strategy, this year's priority will be patching and repairing damage, before future-proofing our roads to make sure they last.

New road maintenance contracts introduced this year will mean the work is done better than ever – delivering better value for Victorians' money, less disruption while crews get on with the work, and higher-quality road maintenance, where it's needed most.

Department of Transport and Planning Chief of Regional Transport Michael Bailey said, "Using more data and more technology than ever before our experts have put together a program or works that will repair the worst of last year's flood damage and deliver smoother, more reliable journeys for hundreds of thousands of Victorians each year."

It also means more local jobs for hardworking regional Victorians, with more than 360 great local jobs and a huge economic boost to regional communities.

It comes on top of a massive maintenance blitz delivered over the past 12 months, which saw more than 1800 kilometres of the state's roads undergo rebuilding and repair work, including hundreds of major road rebuilding, resurfacing, and sealing works on the Western, Hume, Calder, Sunraysia and Murray Valley highways.

More than 370,000 potholes have been patched, 21,000 signs repaired or replaced, tens of thousands of kilometres of roadside grass and weeds have been mowed, slashed, and sprayed and more than 290,000 tonnes of snow have been shifted from roads across the state's Alpine regions.

FOREST FIREFIGHTERS AT THE FOREFRONT OF BUSHFIRE RESPONSE

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) is stronger than ever ahead of the upcoming bushfire season with a significant boost to its workforce and rapid response capability.

Minister for Environment Steve Dimopoulos today announced the Allan Labor Government has bolstered crew numbers to combat bushfires – investing \$21.7 million to create 100 ongoing and 54 fixed term Forest Fire Operations Officer positions, adding to the 550 seasonal firefighters recruited to work with FFMVic this season.

The resources boost means more boots on the ground to respond and reduce the risk of bushfire to communities through planned burns, mechanical fuel treatments and maintenance of our strategic fuel break network.

Steve Dimopoulos, Minister for Environment, said "Living with a changing climate means bushfires are occurring more often and are more intense – that's why we are investing in our forest firefighters who are at the frontline of protecting our communities and environment.

"It has been a pleasure meeting with some of our forest firefighters and learning more about the special skills and equipment they use to reduce bushfire risk and respond to fires."

The recent firefighter recruitment builds an 1800-strong force of FFMVic personnel on the frontline – so alongside other partner agencies, departments and volunteers, Victoria will have more than 62,800 people in fire and emergency roles for this upcoming bushfire season.

Minister for Emergency Services Jaclyn Symes said, "Our emergency management services are well prepared for the upcoming bushfire season and I urge all Victorians to be ready too."

The workforce prepares and responds to bushfires all year round – between 1 July and 30 September of this year, FFMVic firefighters responded to 142 fires, which is just below the 10-year average of 148 during the same period.

FFMVic also supports a range of emergency response activities including Victoria's recent floods and deployment to Canada to combat wildfires.

Chief Fire Officer Chris Hardman said, Forest Fire Management Victoria "Victoria will always have bushfires, but we can assure communities that when a bushfire starts, FFMVic is ready to respond – we work every day to reduce bushfire risk to communities."

Victorians are encouraged to do their part to stay safe this bushfire season by preparing their properties, making a Bushfire Plan and staying up to date on emergency information and warnings.




