

### Shining a light on Council offices

The side of the Civic Centre in Camperdown was lit up with the debut of a new projection system as about 1500 people enjoyed the Light Up Camperdown festival on Friday night.

The installation was funded by a grant from the State Government's \$5 million Our Regions: Living Local – Regional Fund. Minister for Regional Development Gayle Tierney said the projector was a real win for Corangamite.

"We're proud to back this project as it brings the local community together in celebration and attracts visitors passing by to enjoy what's on offer in the region."



The fund is aimed at activating public spaces to promote social connections, enhance liveability and revitalise regional shopping strips. Corangamite Shire Mayor Kate Makin said the projector would be an asset to make the town centre more vibrant and would improve safety by providing more lighting.



"It's a great innovation with so many possibilities," Cr Makin said. "The side wall of the Civic Centre makes a great screen that can be seen by motorists travelling down the highway.

"It could potentially provide great opportunities to promote community events and festivals, tourism, special occasions or safety messages. In the new year Council will formalise a set of guidelines for how it can be best used to support our community."

Council Events and Creative Industries Team Leader Tammy Young said the projector was chosen because it could provide brighter and much more vibrant colours than comparable models.

"It uses coloured lasers which provide sharper images and video than projectors using other light sources. The image will be clearer even in less-than-ideal lighting conditions like long summer twilights. It is more energy efficient, using 25% less electricity than many other projectors and is temperature insulated and thermostatically controlled for safety."

The projector was installed by local contractor Dickinson Electrical.



#### The winners of the 2023 Spring in the Shire Photo Essay Competition were announced at the Golden Plains Twilight Market in Bannockburn last week.

This year's theme of Photo[synthesis] supported visual storytellers to explore the beauty of the environment, as well as environmental issues and challenges. Amateur photographers of any skill level were encouraged to capture this theme through their lens. The winners and runners-up included:

Major Prize (18 years and older) - \$600 cash prize.

Runner-up: Lyn Steele – 'The Mighty Moorabool' (Meredith)

Young Adult (13 to 17 years) - \$400 cash prize.

• Winner: Amelia Preston – 'Freddy the Frog' (Rokewood)

Runner-up – Sophia Rowling – 'A Sunset' (Teesdale)

Junior Prize (up to 12 years) - \$200 cash prize.

• Winner: Jessica Richens – 'Two Little Bugs' (Inverleigh)

Runner-up – Clancy Steele – 'Reflection of Tree in Water' (Inverleigh)

Prize sponsors included Turosi Giving, Bannockburn Free Range Chicken and Geelong Landcare and runnerup prize winners received a handmade basket by Wadawurrung artist Trina Dalton Odgies.

Golden Plains Shire Council Mayor Cr Brett Cunningham said the 27 competition entries truly captured the Shire's natural beauty and surrounds.

"We were very impressed with the quality of entries for this year's competition which really highlighted the beautiful surrounds, vibrant communities, and amazing flora and fauna we have in Golden Plains," Cr Cunningham said.

"I would also like to thank Spring in the Shire judges Caitlin and Jemma from the Youth Activation Committee, Cr Helena Kirby, RMIT's Dr Li Ping Thong and Deakin University's Dr Sean Loughrey as well as the generous support of our sponsors who made the competition possible."

The Spring in the Shire Photo Essay Exhibition will feature at locations including the Bannockburn Cultural Centre, The Well in Smythesdale and the Golden Plains Civic Centre in Bannockburn over the next 12 months.

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### Skipton Rail Trail back in action after flood repairs

The Skipton end of the Ballarat-Skipton Rail Trail is back in action after the last of extensive repairs were completed.

Council's Infrastructure Projects Officer Dean Finlayson said the trail was significantly damaged by floods in October 2022.

"After the floods civil engineers did an assessment and determined floodway, re-sheeting and drainage works were required," Mr Finlayson said.

"A local contractor re-sheeted about 5.5 km of the trail managed by Council between Anderson Street and Spring Hill Road.

"The works included reconstruction of damaged sections including the concrete floodway just south of the Skipton golf course.

"We've also built up, reshaped and graded the trail to improve drainage, re-sheeted and rolled the surface, and provided side



drainage to allow water to run into existing table drains.

"The works will significantly reduce the risks of future erosion due to drainage from severe wet weather."

North Ward Councillor Nick Cole said the timing was perfect with the trail open for the festive season holiday and summer.

"The rail trail is a great asset for Skipton," Cr Cole said.

"It's a safe and accessible way for locals to get out for some exercise and enjoy fresh air, sunshine and the beautiful environment.

"It's also an inviting gateway to bring cyclists, hikers and horse riders down from Ballarat to explore what we have in Corangamite.

"A new coffee shop is open in town now – Bluestone, Bubbles and Banter – where visitors and tourists can enjoy a nice cuppa and wind down on the banks of the very scenic Mt Emu creek after the rail trail."

Local Government Victoria's Council Flood Support Fund provided \$315,000 for the repairs.

**From the Editor:** On behalf of the wider Skipton Community, and the users of the Skipton-Ballarat Rail Trail, I would like to express sincere thanks to the Local and State Governments for making these funds available to restore the Rail Trail (through the Corangamite Shire Council Flood Support Fund for Skipton) to see this much needed and much appreciated restoration project to fruition.

The Ballarat Skipton Rail Trail is extremely popular with hikers, cyclists and horse riders who choose to travel in the quiet serenity the trail allows to make the pleasant trip to Skipton. Some come shorter distances than others, and some come all the way from Ballarat (and beyond), to enjoy the lovely scenery along their way with the yellow canola in bloom and cereal crops, grazing animals, and the properties set aside for wildlife sanctuary, and along the trail to Skipton to find all that the town offers. There are some who bring a tent to stay overnight at the end of the trail.

The Skipton end of Ballarat Skipton Rail Trail forms part of the Linking Skipton Network of walking trails making it possible to do a small loof around Jubilee Park, or to go right around the full distance. Traders of the Town have indeed been fortunate to welcome visitors passing through the town and to share stories they tell of their travels along the way.

With terrific food outlets and the opportunity to buy stuff for a picnic to enjoy the beautiful parklands in Skipton before heading home again. K

# Have you experienced property damage, trauma, or loss as a result of the 2022 Victorian floods?

The Recovery Support Program can provide support for people who have been affected by the 2022 Victorian floods.

Recovery Support Workers are a single point of contact for those who need it. Support provided by them may include:

- A discussion about your needs and what next steps might be appropriate.
- Referrals to external agencies for mental health and wellbeing needs.
- Information and resources to connect you to local services to assist in the recovery process.
- Advocacy and assistance with completing applications/paperwork required for financial or insurance claim processes and grants.
- Assistance with access to available material support options.
- Advocate on your behalf regarding recovery challenges.
- Outreach visits by an allocated Recovery Support Worker if this is helpful to your situation.

The Recovery Support service may be able to provide you with a small amount of financial support to respond to immediate financial need.

### Who's it for?

Individuals and families who live in Victoria who were impacted by the 2022 flood events.

### Cost

There is no charge for the support provided by this program that is funded by the Commonwealth -State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) and the Victorian Government.
